### **EULOGY FOR THE LATE ROY ALLEN MILLER – by Earl Harder**

Roy Allen Miller; a husband, father, grandfather, uncle, son-in-law, brother-in-law, and a friend. Everyone here knew Roy in one special way or another and have many fond memories of him that we will all treasure and cherish always.

I have had the privilege of knowing Roy since 1990 when I met him in a pool hall, surprise, surprise!! Roy's family owned a two story house in Duvall, two doors west of the pool hall. His

father was a barber and a farmer. His barber shop was next door to the café, pool room and bowling alley. His mother Molly ran the restaurant and Roy worked at the bowling alley and pool room. Roy always told me the funny thing about him bowling a 400 game is that he did it before he ever bowled a 300 game. One night, on his 25<sup>th</sup> birthday, everyone went home to bed early, leaving Roy to close the pool hall alone. Did this phase Roy? Nope, he just came home

singing Happy Birthday to himself. When Roy would close the pool room at the end of each day, he would check every coin, looking for special marks. It was his mother that taught him about coins and got him started on his way to the coin collector we all knew him to be.

Roy was a founding member of the Regina Coin Club in 1953. His membership number is 10. He received a 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary award in 2003. Roy has always loved cars. He always had a new car usually before the warranty was expired. Since he always had the newest and nicest car, the girls would ask him to drive them to the dances. Roy would say "I always take you there, but you never leave with me." That was his standing joke.

Roy loved to eat and always liked to party. He has always been known to have a very dry sense of humor. Roy had spending money, but didn't spend it freely. He one time used a \$100 bill to buy a 5 cent cigar.

One time out at Southampton, Roy wouldn't play Horseshoes because it would cost a quarter which he knew he would lose. On the other hand, Roy took Gord's Suburban and loaded it up with all the kids that it would hold. He then took them all to the movies where he paid their way in and bought them popcorn, drinks and any other treats without any expectations. This is typical of Roy as he loved kids and had a soft spot for them all in his heart.

Roy was never a picky eater, but his favorite foods were definitely ice cream, chocolate and dessert in general. He loved to watch hockey and play pool. Roy was never known as a handyman. However you would think he was a character on the Red Green Show with his hot glue gun, duct tape, silicon (cases of it), and of course WD-40 (solves all problems). Roy has been a coin dealer for his entire life. He was even in Winnipeg at the beginning of this month for a coin show there. Roy attended shows all over North America.

In 1962, Roy married Priscilla Marusiak. Priscilla traveled with Roy to all his coin shows faithfully. They enjoyed driving together throughout North America. Priscilla had to learn quickly how to "hold it" longer than she was used to ever before. Anyone who has traveled with Roy knows exactly what I mean when I say that.

In 1971, Roy and Priscilla took in a young lady by the name of Adele who was pregnant. Roy and Priscilla adopted this baby girl from birth and named her Roxanne. Roxanne was the apple of Roy's eye. Priscilla and Roxanne accompanied Roy to all of the coin shows until Roxanne was in grade 2 or 3. Roy drove to every one of these shows and had his license until his dying day. On that note, when Roy had his quintuple bypass in 2000, he was forced to check himself in for surgery, or the doctor threatened to revoke his driver's license. Needless to say Roy quickly checked himself in. After the surgery, Roy, being the patient man that we all knew, believed he had been there long enough and felt the doctors were not checking him out soon enough for his liking so he took it upon himself to check out of the hospital. After all he did have a coin show to go to.

In 1989, Roy became a grandfather to a wonderful baby boy named Gregory Blake Miller. He was very honored to have someone to carry on the Miller name and legacy. Greg has always been Roy's greatest pride and joy. In 1998, Roy was blessed with another grandson, Lance Anthony Harder. Lance never ceased to amaze grandpa with his knowledge of cars and sports. In 2000, Roy finally got a granddaughter, Vanessa Geraldine Harder. This little girl had grandpa wrapped around her little finger from the day she was born. In fact, whenever the grandchildren would come to visit, they would rifle through Grandpa's pockets, looking for treats and loose change, which always brought a smile to his face.

In 2002, Roy came with my hockey team and I to Toronto for our National Championships and cheered us on to victory. I can honestly say that Roy was always our biggest fan. This was one of the times that I witnessed Roy truly enjoy himself. Sadly in 2004, Roy lost his daughter

Roxanne to ovarian cancer, a blow that he never really recovered from. At last now, he is reunited with her and we can all take peace in knowing they are together.

Roy was always a caring man, loving husband, giving father and doting grandfather. He always believed the best in everybody. Roy always tried to make people laugh. It was his way of making the world around him a better place. He was always selfless and would give you the shirt off his back. I am sure that everyone here has benefited in one way or another from Roy's mysterious generosity. Roy's words to live by have always been: "If it weren't for bad luck, I'd have no luck at all."

**NEWS FROM THE BRITISH ROYAL MINT (adapted from Royal Mint publicity leaflet)**

Five exciting new reverse designs take their place in the 2007 United Kingdom Proof Set, struck by the British Royal Mint. Centerpiece of the 2007 United Kingdom coins is the magnificent £5 Diamond Wedding crown, while two £2 coins mark the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the abolition of the slave trade within the British Empire and the 300<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Act of Union, joining England and Scotland under one Parliament. The 100<sup>th</sup> birthday of the founding of the World Scout Movement is celebrated on the 50p coin. The 2007 £1 coin represents England and features the Gateshead Millennium Bridge.

In 2007 Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip will celebrate their 60<sup>th</sup> year of marriage –their Diamond Wedding Anniversary. To mark this wonderful occasion the British Royal Mint has issued a specially commissioned crown piece featuring a conjoint portrait of the royal couple by Ian Rank-Broadley, FRBS (*Figure 1d*). Rank-Broadley's effigy of the Queen has, of course, featured on the obverse of all United Kingdom circulating coinage since 1998. Indeed the Diamond Wedding crown is one of only a handful of British coins to bear a conjoint portrait. The reverse design (*Figure 1e*) is by Emma Noble, and features the north rose window of Westminster Abbey. The Latin inscription: TVEATVR VNITA DEVS translating as "May God guard these united" frames the delicate design.

The first of the two £2 coins marks the Act of Union, between England and Scotland which took effect on May 1<sup>st</sup>, 1707, with Queen Anne becoming the first sovereign of the United Kingdom. She continued to reign until her death on August 1<sup>st</sup>, 1714. Interesting accommodations were made regarding taxes between the two countries. Scotland, while being subject to many of the taxes being paid in England, was to be exempt from paying the window tax paid in England, stamp tax, coal tax and – importantly – no duty was to be paid on malt!

The reverse of the Act of Union £2 (*Figure 1a*) coin is designed by Scottish heraldic artist Yvonne Holton, and brings together the thistle of Scotland and the rose of England. The emblems are cleverly enjoined with the portcullis incorporated as a representation of Parliament. The artist's initials appear – appropriately – beneath the thistle.

The second £2 coin marks the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Act of Parliament Abolishing the Slave Trade within the British Empire. Created by David Gentleman, known particularly for his stamp designs, the reverse design (*Figure 1c*) depicts a simple yet powerful image – the symbolic break in the chains of oppression, and the commemorative year 1807. Also, in a break from tradition, the denomination value of TWO POUNDS is displayed on the obverse design.

Representing England, the 2007 £1 coin bears the last in a series of four designs by Edwina Ellis featuring famous bridges of Britain - the Gateshead Millennium Bridge (*Figure 1b*). Conceived by architects Wilkinson Eyre with structural engineers Gifford and Partners, the bridge is a foot and cycle bridge spanning the River Tyne between Gateshead on the south bank, and Newcastle upon Tyne on the north bank. The bridge was lifted into place in one piece by the Asian Hercules II, one of the largest floating cranes on November 20, 2000 and was opened to the public on September 17.

The 2007 50 pence coin (*Figure 1f*) celebrates the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the founding of the Scout Movement which coincidentally is also the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the birth of its founder Baron Robert Baden-Powell. A highly decorated Lt. General, Baden Powell served with distinction in the British Army, particularly in Africa, which he came to love. His involvement with training young cadets led him to write a number of books and articles about scouting. Following the founding of the Scouting Movement in 1907 which, of course has since evolved into an international organization, he assisted his sister Agnes and wife Olave in founding the Girl Guides Movement in 1910. Baden-Powell lies buried in Kenya. The reverse design of the 50 pence is by Kerry Jones and depicts the official Fleur de Lys emblem, embossed on a representation of the globe, surrounded by the well-known scouting motto BE PREPARED.

The reverse designs of the other seven coins featured in the 12-coin collection remain unchanged. The obverse portrait, common to all current United Kingdom circulating coins is by Ian Rank-Broadley and is the fourth effigy of the Queen to appear on British coinage during her fifty-year reign.



# A hobby that's full of change

Coin collector Royce Hall buys and sells numerous rare and hard-to-find coins, but even he was surprised at the coin that turned up on his table at the Regina Coin Club's fall show this weekend.

The Dauphin, Man., resident was only eight years old when his mother took him to a fair around 1950.

"They had a machine there you could put in a dime and you could print out on an aluminum disc (with) your name and address," he said. "So I had printed 'Royce Hall, Dauphin Manitoba.' And somewhere within the next year I lost it."

But upon attending the coin show Saturday — which he has attended for the majority of the last 40 years — he was surprised to see his old souvenir again.

"Local dealer George Mann had passed this back to me and he said 'Royce, you lost this,'" said Hall. "I was shocked, but I remembered it as soon as I saw it."

Mann, president of the Regina Coin Club, said he spotted the token in a coin collection he bought earlier this year. He said it shows how coins, no matter how old or rare or odd, tend to keep circulating.

He said he is still waiting to hear the results of a recent experiment in which the club deeded six rare coins which the Leader-Post's Will Chabou put into circulation. The experiment was intended to encourage people to take a closer look at the coins they carry around with them every day. In case they happen to have one of the coins — worth more than \$200 in total.

The Regina coin show has run twice each year since 1983, bringing coin enthusiasts from across Canada and the United States. The show features everything from historic or rare Canadian and American coins to ancient Greek and Roman coins.

Mann also has a collection of "odd and curious money," which includes replica knives and spades that were used more than 2000 years ago in China to replace the actual farming implements they traded prior to that.

Mann and fellow collector Jim Fedey use the coin club's education committee to encourage new kids to get into coin collecting.

"For a teacher, anything to do with coins opens the door to history of the countries in the world, and kids love that stuff," said Fedey.

That's something eight-year-old Brendan McLeod is already beginning to learn. The Wainwright resident has been coming to the coin show with his dad, James, since he started coin collecting three or four years ago.

This year, Brendan picked up a colourful Australian coin featuring a fire engine to add to his growing collection.

"I've got some Jurassic Park tokens, Harry Potter tokens, a few Canadian circulation coins," he said. "I like looking very close at them."

James said he's been a collector for about 20 years and is pleased he can now share his enthusiasm for the hobby with his two sons.

**THROUGH A GLASS DARKLY...A LOOK AT 1907**

At the beginning of a New Year, our traditional look back one hundred years...

January 1907 started dramatically with an earthquake and fires in Jamaica that devastated Kingston, killing hundreds of people. In Iran (then Persia), the 54-year old Shah Muzzaffar ad-Din died on January 19<sup>th</sup>. An enlightened leader, who introduced a constitution and parliament and furthered other reforms started by his father, he also planned schools for the education of women. He was succeeded by his son Muhammad Ali.

In London, February 13<sup>th</sup>, suffragettes stormed the British Parliament demanding the vote for women. Over 60 were arrested. On February 20<sup>th</sup>, Honduran Troops invaded Nicaragua to halt President Jose Zelaya's expansionist policies.

In March, the New York Stock Market suffered its worst crash since 1901, taking millions of dollars off the books of some of the largest and most powerful companies in the United States, including the Union Pacific Railroad Co., and Amalgamated Copper. Women gained the vote in Finland and voted in their first election on the 15<sup>th</sup>, returning several women deputies. Mohandas Ghandi began his campaign against the Transvaal Government's *Asiatic Registration Bill*, which marked the beginning of what would latter become 'Apartheid'.

April saw the evacuation of both Russian and Japanese troops from the Chinese province of Manchuria. (Japanese designs on Manchuria, and later clashes with Russian troops on the border foreshadowed the beginnings of the Second World War in Asia.) Early in the month Honduran and Salvadoran troops massed on the border of Nicaragua to resist that county's threatened advance, but by April 25<sup>th</sup> a Central American peace conference had been called to establish a lasting accord in the region.

Labour unrest came to the fore in May with widespread demonstrations in America over the trial for murder of Bill Haywood, founder and head of the union *Industrial Workers of the World*. The charges related to complicity in the 1905 assassination of ex-Governor Frank Seunenberg of Idaho. The trial was hailed as “the beginning of the fight between capital and labour...” In New York, at the National Association of Manufacturers’ convention, J.W. Van Cleve claimed unions “...are a much greater menace to the United States than foreign wars.”

By June, women in the newly independent (1905) Kingdom of Norway had also won the right to vote. In France the brothers Louis Jean and Auguste Lumiere announced the development of a three-colour photographic process. Floods in Kentucky and Tennessee drowned 29 people.

July saw the abdication of the Emperor of Korea in favour of his son, a response to Japanese pressure that followed anti-Japanese riots. By July 25<sup>th</sup>, Korea was under full Japanese control and severe reprisals against Korean nationalists, including crucifixions and public decapitations, were under way. In Britain, Sir Robert Baden-Powell founded the scouting movement to develop “... a sense of community service, chivalry, physical fitness... and to help in making the rising generation, of whatever class or creed, into good citizens...”

The dog-days of August 1907 passed without much of note: France bombed Casablanca in retaliation for the murder there of French citizens; race riots raged in Harlem, New York; Britain invaded Venezuela from British Guiana, demanding the surrender of 4,000 pounds of balata gum (!) and the Quebec Bridge across the St. Lawrence River in Montreal, collapsed on August 29<sup>th</sup>, causing the drowning of 80 people.

On September 6<sup>th</sup> the liner Lusitania left Southampton on its maiden voyage, arriving in New York on the 11<sup>th</sup> and thereby setting a new trans-Atlantic record of 5 days, 54 minutes. New Zealand gained autonomy as a Dominion of the British Empire on September 25<sup>th</sup>. In China, the Kuomintang, a group dedicated to the overthrow of the Manchu Dynasty and establishment of a republic, became active.

The rules of war were overhauled in October at the Peace Conference initiated by President Theodore Roosevelt in The Hague: new rules protected the property of neutral countries and call for a declaration of war before hostilities begin.

A treaty whereby King Leopold II ceded the Congo Free State to Belgium was signed on November 28<sup>th</sup> by the Belgian prime minister de Trooz. This was the culmination of investigations into widespread human right abuses in the Congo, ruled since 1884 as a personal fiefdom by the Belgian king. The transmission of photographs by cable was developed.

In December, Rudyard Kipling, author of *The Jungle Book*, *Captains Courageous*, *Kim* and many famous poems such as *Gunga Din* and *If*, won the Nobel Prize for literature. American Suffragettes began their campaign for the vote and President Roosevelt announced a circum-Pacific tour by the United States Pacific Fleet. Admiral Togo was quoted as saying that when the fleet reached Japan “We will greet the men as friends.”

**PARALLELS IN DESIGN...THE NEW MONTANA QUARTER ECHOES REGINA'S CENTENNIAL DOLLAR.**

The United States Mint's first commemorative quarter in the long-running commemorative series that started in 1999, is for Montana, which became the 41<sup>st</sup> state of the union on November 8<sup>th</sup>, 1889. Montana shares a common border with Saskatchewan, and now shares a similar commemorative coin design, or at least a major element in a design – the buffalo skull. Evocative of those days not so long ago, when vast herds of buffalo roamed the Prairies, the *buffalo skull recalls the dependence of the Plains Indians on the buffalo herds for food, clothing and shelter*. It also reminds us how in a short time, overhunting by Metis and Europeans reduced the herds to near extinction. A buffalo skull formed the major element in a design by Walter Ott for the reverse of the 1982 silver dollar commemorating Regina's centenary as a settlement (figure 1). Between its horns is the front view of the Legislative Building in Wascana Park. 'Wascana' is from the Cree 'Oscana' meaning 'bones'. Regina's early name - 'Pile o' Bones' - referred to the 40-foot diameter, 6-foot high cylindrical piles of buffalo bones in the area, built by the Indians as part of their hunting-lore. The buffalo would, it was believed, never desert the land where the bones of their kin rested; the ceremonial piles of bones would ensure future successful hunts.




Figure 2. Reverse of the 2007 quarter dollar for Montana, part of the continuing 'State Quarters' program

A buffalo skull also forms the main feature of the new Montana quarter (figure 2): between its horns is the legend 'Montana 1889', to the right is the motto 'Big Sky Country' (bearing similarity to Saskatchewan's slogan 'Land of Living Skies') and beneath, a portrayal of the dramatic landscape of mountains, plains and rivers for which the state is so justly famous. The two coins form a unique artistic pair.




## **UNITED STATES PRESIDENTIAL DOLLARS**

On November 26<sup>th</sup> last year, the United States Mint unveiled the first designs for the series of Presidential Dollars that will be issued, four each year from 2007 to 2016, to honour all deceased U.S. Presidents. The dollars will be issued starting in February 2007 in the order in which the presidents served their terms of office. The coins will be the same size, weight, metal composition and magnetic signature as the current Sacagawea dollar, so that they will be readily

accepted in vending machines. The first coin will depict George Washington (Figure 1). The common reverse design is an impressive rendering of the Statue of Liberty, viewed as if looking up from the base (Figure 2). Whether the coins will circulate in the United States is another matter. The refusal of the U.S. Treasury to withdraw the dollar bill and cease printing replacements is one of the factors that has stalled acceptance of a one dollar coin. Ironically, the coins are guaranteed to circulate in – of all places – Ecuador, which has ceased to use its own money in favour of using the stable and widely accepted U.S. currency.

To relieve the clutter of mottos and inscriptions on the obverse and reverse of the series, the obligatory E PLURIBUS UNUM (*Out of Many, One*), IN GOD WE TRUST, date and mint mark (P= Philadelphia; D= Denver and S= San Francisco) will all be placed on the edge as an incuse inscription (Figure 3). Furthermore, for the first time in U.S. coinage, the value will be written as \$1 rather than ONE DOLLAR. This is the first time in over two hundred years of coinage that the dollar sign has been used on a United States coin.

Every president will be honoured with a single coin, regardless of how many times he served consecutively. However, because Grover Cleveland served two non-consecutive terms (1885-1889 and 1893-1897), he will be recognized on *two* coins in 2012, the 22<sup>nd</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup> in the series.

Living presidents cannot be depicted on U.S. coins, so that the series at the moment ends with Richard Nixon (1969-1974). The death of Gerald Ford on December 26<sup>th</sup> last year will likely extend the scheduled coins by one. Gerald Ford succeeded Richard Nixon on August 8, 1974 on the latter's resignation. He was the only president never to have been elected to office. Ford, Republican leader of the House, had been nominated to the office of Vice President by Richard Nixon on October 12, 1973, when Spiro Agnew resigned after charges of tax evasion. Jimmy Carter defeated Ford in the November 1976 election.

To complement the dollar coins, the U.S. Mint will issue a series of ½ ounce .9999 fine gold coins depicting the wife of each president and inscribed with the years during which they were married to the president during his term of office. Of the first four coins, numbers 1, 2 and 4 respectively will bear portraits of Martha Washington, Abigail Adams and Dolley Madison. Instead of a common reverse, each coin will illustrate an event in the First Lady's life; the Dolley Madison reverse for instance will show the First Lady saving Cabinet papers and the portrait of George Washington from the White House when the advance of British troops in 1814 forced her and her husband to flee. As Thomas Jefferson's wife died before he was elected to office in 1801, the obverse of coin 3 will bear the portrait of Liberty from the Draped Bust half cent of 1800-1808.

### **NEW GREATEST BRITONS COINS FROM THE FALKLAND ISLANDS**

In 2005 more than half a million Britons cast their votes to decide who was the greatest Briton of all time. Last year Pobjoy Mint honoured two of the revered figures from the final top thirty, Admiral Nelson (number nine) and Isambard Kingdom Brunel (number two), with coin releases. The coins were produced on behalf of the Falkland Islands, the overseas territory of Britain, which has strong links with both these two figures. Brunel was the engineer responsible for the ship the SS Great Britain which, after running aground in the Falklands, was used as storage for coal and replenished the battle cruisers, which helped win the Battle of the Falkland Islands on 8 December 1914 during the First World War. Nelson very nearly made the Falklands the location of his first sea battle when, at the age of 12, in 1770, he was due to sail with his captain uncle to defend the islands against the Spanish. But the conflict blew over.

Now, by popular demand, Pobjoy Mint is proud to unveil another four coins in the Greatest Britons series from the Falkland Islands (Figure 4).

Elizabeth I, the last of the Tudor monarchs reached number seven in the poll. She was queen at the time the first settlement grew up on the Falkland Islands. Famous naturalist Charles Darwin came in at number four. He visited the islands in 1833 aboard *The Beagle*. Lord Baden-Powell, creator of the scout movement and at number 13 in the poll, was presented with the vessel *Discovery* by the Falkland Islands government in 1947 for the use of his Sea Scouts.

But this stunning set of coins wouldn't be complete without a tribute to the person voted the Greatest Briton of all time. Sixty years after he led Britain through the Second World War, Winston Churchill came out top and his beautifully crafted coin brings the total in this two-year set from the Falkland Islands to six. The coins are available in cupronickel and proof sterling silver with each precious metal version being struck four times the lustrous Pobjoy finish.

#### **REGINA COIN CLUB DISPLAY AWARDS**

For the Fall Show 2006 last October, the Executive of the Regina Coin Club instituted awards for best displays in each of two categories, Junior and Adult (Figures 5 & 6). The adult award has since been named for the late Roy Miller, a founder member of the Club. The motive is to encourage members of the Club to put in displays at both the annual shows, Spring and Fall. Displays are seen as a way of communicating the educational value of coin collecting to young and old alike, particularly to the general public, many of whom may have collected coins when they were younger, and whose interest may be revived by seeing how coins can be selected and arranged around a subject of the displayers choice. Breanna's display was an excellent example of a well-defined theme: the twelve Canada 125 commemorative 25 cent circulating coins of 1992. The display featured details of the subject of each design and short biographies of each designer, many of whom were young artists completing their first commission. Dave's display focused on the Queen's 80<sup>th</sup> Birthday, using a mixture of coins and stamps to show the many portraits of the Queen that had been used since she first appeared on a Canadian stamp in 1935. That issue was to commemorate the Silver Jubilee of her grandfather, King George V and depicted other members of the Royal Family including Edward Prince of Wales (later Edward VIII), and Elizabeth's father the Duke of York (later King George VI). Hopefully, these Awards will encourage others to start thinking about their own displays for the Spring Show!

### **PRESIDENT'S REPORT BY GEORGE MANZ**

The Spring Show, on Saturday April 21 and Sunday April 22 is fast approaching. The new venue, at the Western Christian College gymnasium, is easy to get to. It's on the corner of 4th Avenue and Lewvan Drive. After you get onto 4th Avenue going west, you turn right on Connaught Street. You are then going north. Go north about a block and turn right into the WCC parking lot. After you park, you can go through the main rear doors. The first door to your left will get you to the gymnasium.

There will be several highlights for the first show of the year in our new venue. The staff at the Western Christian College has been very helpful in assisting us stage the show. And what a show

it's going to be! It will showcase Canada's rarest and most expensive gold coin, a 1916C sovereign minted in Ottawa, one of fewer than 30 known to exist and is one of the finest known examples in existence. Here's your once in a lifetime chance to see this extremely rare coin, one that is missing from almost every Canadian coin collection. This 1916C sovereign is certified by PCGS and is graded MS-63 and was once in both the Belzberg and Mason collections, put together by two advanced collectors who had collected one of each Canadian decimal coin issued for circulation. A similar coin, but without the pedigree, sold in Australia last summer for \$93,000.

The coin is not for sale, but is on a western Canadian coin show tour. The owner has agreed to allow the Regina Coin Club to showcase the coin at our event. After that, the coin will be displayed at the Royal Canadian Mint show in Winnipeg, and later, at a coin show in Edmonton. I'm pleased to announce Conexus Credit Union will place the coin in their vault for safekeeping while it is in Regina. Conexus has even allowed our club to have a press conference in their facility, so if you're not doing anything on Thursday April 19 at 10:00 am, come on down to Conexus (corner of Albert Street and Victoria Avenue) to see the coin first hand.

CKCK TV has allowed your president to talk to their viewers on Tuesday April 17 between 12:00 noon and 12:30 pm. In addition, on Wednesday April 18, I will appear on John Gormley's CJME Radio phone-in show between 11:15 and noon, and then on CBC Radio later that day between 1:00 and 1:40. My purpose will be to let Saskatchewan residents know about the coin show as well as our new venue.

Paul Daniel, our hard-working Spring Show Chairperson, informs me that all indications are we will have a fantastic show. Most of the tables are already sold to dealers from as far away as Hamilton, including quite a few new dealers from across the country. If you have time to help us set up the show on Friday April 20 at 6:00 pm, why not come and give us a hand? We can really use the help! And speaking of help, we also need volunteers to help tear down the show. That will commence about 4:00 pm on Sunday afternoon.

This year's show will not only provide free coins from our Treasure Chest for children 12 years of age and younger, but in addition, the first 500 people who attend will receive a free Canadian large cent. Large cents were issued between 1858 and 1920. So here's your chance to start a large cent collection.

Lastly, Saturday night April 21 will feature a coin auction. The auction, conducted by George Manz Coin Auctions, features 180 lots of coins, medals, tokens, paper money, odd and curious money, edged weapons, RCMP memorabilia, military medals and coin displays. The auction features Part 1 of the Roy Miller Collection. Roy was one of the founding members of the Regina Coin Club in 1953 and passed away last November. Here's your chance to own a coin or banknote from Roy's personal collection.

I'd like to thank the many volunteers (both regular members and executive members) who have pitched in to make this show a success. Without your hard work, the show could not go on. See you at the show! - George

**SOUTH GEORGIA HONOURS THE BRITONS WHO'VE HELPED MAKE IT GREAT**

In 2005, when more than half a million Britons cast their votes to decide who was the Greatest Briton of all time, little did they know that included in their top thirty would be three people closely linked with the tiny UK Overseas Territory, South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands. Pobjoy Mint, on behalf of that Government has produced a set of three new coins honouring these distinguished three Greatest Britons (Figure 1). **Elizabeth II**, the current British monarch reached number 24 in the poll and is Head of State of the Territory.

Explorer **Sir Ernest Shackleton** came in at number 11. He's buried on South Georgia after dying of a heart attack during his 1922 quest to circumnavigate the Antarctic continent. His most famous previous visit had been during the opening months of the first world war when he led an expedition which saw his ship, *The Endurance*, become encased in ice for 18 months and eventually break up, leaving him and his crew marooned. Thanks to his perseverance and bravery, all were eventually rescued.

**Captain James Cook** explorer, navigator and cartographer sailed in at number 12. He was the first known voyager to set foot on South Georgia in 1775, and named the island in honour of his king.

### C.N.A ANNOUNCE "DESIGN YOUR OWN COIN" CONTEST FOR JUNIORS

The Canadian Numismatic Association *Coin Kids Committee* and the 2007 C.N.A. Convention is pleased to announce a coin design contest for juniors. All juniors age 16 and under are eligible, whether they are members of the C.N.A. or not. They are asked to submit a design for a Canadian coin, along with a description and reasons for the choice of design. It can be any denomination, including a potential \$5 coin. Submissions should be line drawings around 8" in diameter. The line drawings may be colourized, either in whole or in part. Parents should only offer encouragement and not participate in the selection of designs or assist in the drawing under

any circumstances. Entries can be either serious or humorous. Up to 3 entries per junior are allowed. To be eligible, submissions must be received 30 days prior to the beginning of the 2007 C.N.A. Convention, namely by June 11, 2007. Entries will be displayed at the Convention in Niagara Falls. Voting will be done via ballots that will be included in every Registration Kit and given to daily admissions. Ballots will be tallied and the person getting the most votes will receive the following prizes in two different age categories:

- 1st Place - Limited edition 2007 deluxe coin set commemorating the 2007 C.N.A. Convention. This set is available only at the C.N.A. Convention from the Royal Canadian Mint booth in very limited quantity. Total cost is over \$100.00.

## **PRESIDENT'S REPORT BY GEORGE MANZ**

I hope all members had a fantastic summer. Now that Fall's here, I'd like to invite you all to our first autumn meeting, and what a meeting it will be! First off, we will have another auction, including quite a few more items from the *Roy Miller Collection*. (Items from Roy's collection are listed elsewhere in this newsletter). Then we will have the *Pandora's Box*, where everyone can drop in coins and get a ticket for each coin you donate to the box. Then we will pick out one ticket and give everything in the box to the lucky ticket holder. It's been a lot of fun at previous meetings.

Then we will have a wonderful presentation by Jim Smalley on the coins and paper money aboard the Titanic.

Following the presentation, we will have our business portion of our meeting, including a

presentation to the Regina Coin Club for having been a member of the American Numismatic Association for the last 25 years.

### REGINA COIN CLUB FALL SHOW

Our fall coin show and sale is quickly approaching. Mark **Saturday October 20<sup>th</sup> & Sunday October 21<sup>st</sup>** on your calendars. The show and sale will once again be at the Western Christian College gymnasium. Your fall show chair, Jim Tourand, informs me that there are still a few tables available but tables are going quickly, so if any of you want to sell some of your coins, please contact Jim at (306) 924-2303 or email him at [mipetservice@accesscomm.ca](mailto:mipetservice@accesscomm.ca). We will once again require volunteers to staff the door as well as set up the show on Friday night as well as tear it down on Sunday afternoon. Volunteers are needed so we can once again have a successful coin show. And all of you that come to our September coin meeting can get coin show posters to put up on bulletin boards and windows.

### COIN SHOW AUCTION – PART II OF THE ROY MILLER COLLECTION

In addition, the show will once again feature a major coin auction by **George Manz Coin Auctions**, the official auctioneer of the Regina Coin Club. The auction includes 185 lots, including Part II of the *Roy Miller Collection*, one of the founding members of our club, way back in 1953. The first lot is an Antoninianus of Gordian III, the child who became Caesar and Augustus of the Roman Empire at age 13. Struck in AD 240-244, the silver coin is in uncirculated condition.

World coins include a French crusader coin struck for Charles II of Anjou in the 13th century; a nicely toned 2 franc struck for Napoleon Bonaparte in 1810; a British 1745 shilling marked LIMA below George II's bust to indicate it was produced from captured Spanish treasure; an attractive Irish 1805 Bank of Ireland 5 pence token; uncirculated examples of the 1929 half-puffin and one-puffin from the island of Lundy; and a 1967 New Zealand 2 cents muled with a Bahamas 5 cents.

Many Canadian coins are included in the auction, including numerous ICCS certified and graded coins as well as the most attractively toned 1982 Regina Centennial silver dollar the auctioneer has ever seen. The auction also features a large assortment of Newfoundland coinage, including a 1940 Re-Engraved cent. Several ICCS certified Breton tokens head the list of pre-Confederation tokens, while a large rectangular wooden nickel issued in Malden, Massachusetts in 1949 is expected to see spirited bidding.

Medals are one of the highlights at the auction, including six Edward VIII pattern crowns from Australia, India and New Zealand; a French medal commemorating the world's first hot air balloon tests by the Montgolfier Brothers; an unlisted Queen Victoria Diamond Jubilee medal; and an enameled 1902 Coronation medal of Edward VII and Queen Alexandra.

Canadian paper money includes one of each of the three different 1870 25 cents shinplasters, and numerous replacement and radar notes. Military medals and badges, collectables from the RCMP, edged weapons, numismatic books, coin show displays, and a brass CNA Life Membership to Hans Zoell, round out the 185 lots at auction.

The auction starts on **Saturday October 20<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 p.m.** sharp in Room LR-2, near the

gymnasium. Those wishing to receive the auction catalogue can pick one up at the September meeting, or I can send it to you by email, as long as you send me your email address. Jim Tourand, Fall Show Chairman, reports a successful show at the Western Christian College October 20<sup>th</sup> & 21<sup>st</sup> last. Attendance was as follows:

Saturday: 209 Adults; 6 Juniors; 32 Children 12 & Under  
Sunday: 99 Adults; 6 Juniors; 12 Children 12 & Under,

for a total of 364. Although this figure is down on the Fall Show in 2006, dealers generally reported that the level of business was satisfactory. Fall shows, for one reason or another are traditionally less well attended than those held in the spring. This year's numbers on Sunday may well have been affected by the Saskatchewan Roughriders' afternoon game.

**FALL SHOW 2007 CHAIRMAN'S REPORT, OCTOBER 24, 2007**

I would like to start off by thanking the Executive and Membership of our club for entrusting the Fall Show to me. A special thanks to Paul Daniel for all his help and advice, especially when I was totally lost. To all the members who gave their time for set up and tear down, a heartfelt thanks. Having members that are willing to pitch in made the days go a lot smoother! It was a lot of work, but now that I have one show under my belt, I would be happy to continue on. As with any new task, this show was a learning process for me. There are things that I look forward to changing in hopes of improving the shows outcome.

Success is measured in many ways, and although financially lucrative for us, the overall attendance was down slightly. I believe that a different approach to my advertising strategy next year will help, targeting more days of local advertisement. George was able to secure a CTV television commercial for the show free of charge, which received great reviews. The attendance both days was slightly down over last spring's show and last fall's show (see table above). Overall the show was very successful for the clubs coffers, netting a profit of \$1953.04 (revenues of \$5291.00: expenditures of \$3337.96). I want to point out that this profit is only afforded us, by the generously low rent the WCC charges.

Dealers' reactions to the show varied, the most common theme was, "It was a typical Fall Show". Some dealers reported having their best ever Sunday sales, others had slow sales, but in general the majority of the dealers were happy. There were 23 dealers present, with a good majority signing up again for the Spring Show 2008. Any further comments from dealers would be welcomed!

To coincide with the start up of the new Coin Hawks Club (for children 6-15), extra effort was put into securing prizes for the kids: values ranged from \$10 to \$70. I received great response from a number of local businesses, in ways of donations of cash and prizes. I would like to thank the following for their contributions:

### DISPLAYS AT THE FALL SHOW

The Junior Display *Canada's Centennial Commemorative Set*, focused on Canada's commemorative coinage and banknote for 1967 Centennial year, and featured the six circulating coin designs by Alex Colville that were introduced that year, and the 1867-1967 serial number dollar bill. The display was augmented by the coats-of-arms of the Provinces and Territories of Canada. The Centennial designs: 1 cent dove; 5-cent jack rabbit; 10-cent mackerel; 25-cent cougar; 50-cent wolf and Canada goose dollar were the first major changes to circulating coinage in 30 years.

The display *Numismatics of the 1885 Rebellion* used as its backdrop a genuine bunting Union Jack of the period and a colourful woven Métis sash. The subject was illustrated with an example of the North West Canada Medal and Saskatchewan bar (for those who fought at Fish Creek, Batoche, Cut Knife and Frenchman's Butte), bronze and silver editions of the C.N.A. Medal of 1985 commemorating the combat role of the paddle steamer *Northcote*, and the Regina Coin Club 1985 Trade Dollar, on which were depicted the principal figures in the conflict, amongst them General Middleton and Louis Riél. Of particular interest was the group of contemporary coins and 25-cent note (shinplaster) adding up to 75 cents – the daily pay of a soldier (and his horse!) of the time.

The display *I Spy*, centred on the Remembrance Poppy 25-cent coin issued by Canada in 2004. It gave a detailed and interesting account of the bizarre events that followed the report to the U.S. Defense Department by U.S. Army Contractors in early 2007, that they had had coins with what appeared to be some kind of espionage or tracking device embedded in them, planted on them. These were none other than the 'Poppy' quarters! The "several layers of clear but different material plus wire-like mesh on top" wrongly identified by the contractors as micro-circuitry was in fact the protective coating applied by the Canadian Mint to their first colourized circulating coin.

*Allegory on Coins Banknotes and Postage Stamps* illustrated the use made of allegorical figures to portray the ideals of liberty, empire, trade and commerce, the arts and sciences held by the country of issue, on their money and stamps. Particularly prominent were the many and varied portrayals of American *Liberty* and her French predecessor *Marianne*, and the British *Britannia*. The display pointed out that although allegory has largely gone out of fashion, some remnants such as the caduceus (Mercury's staff) and cornucopia (of the Roman goddess Ceres), have survived as mint-marks.

Regina Philatelic Club put together a colourful non-competitive display *Butterflies – an Example of Thematic Collecting* intended as a recruitment advertisement for new members.

### EXECUTIVE MOTION OF THANKS

At their November meeting, the Executive of the Regina Coin Club unanimously passed a motion of thanks recognizing the excellent work done by Spring Show Chairman, Paul Daniel and Fall Show Chairman, Jim Tourand in bringing together two very successful Coin and Stamp shows in the new Western Christian College premises. The Western Christian College staff and students are also thanked for their first-rate co-operation. Last, but not least, all the volunteers

from the Club who helped set up and tear down the Bourse, who sat at the admissions desk, or who put together displays are warmly thanked for their efforts!
